

Feedback from people attending NDTi Social Inclusion Training

In a study of 701 evaluation formsⁱ, 96% of respondents rated the course as interesting, 93% as relevant and 97% as well presented. 274 people added free-text comments, of which 91% were positive and 9% suggested improvements. Here's some of the feedback.

Practical

¹ Social Inclusion training has been offered by NDTi staff since 2000, although the content continues to evolve in response to the changing context and our learning about what works. These evaluation forms were completed between 18/12/06 and 26/9/07 and relate to training delivered by Peter Bates. Respondents used a 6-point scale from 'Not Interesting' to 'Very Interesting'; 'Not at all Relevant' to 'Very Relevant; and 'Presented Poorly to 'Very Well Presented'. The scores cited above include all those scoring 4, 5, or 6. The percentages for those scoring just 5 or 6 were 83% for 'interesting', 75% for 'relevant', and 82% for 'well presented'.
