



Our dear Friends,

Although this is the New Year letter, it is being written only a few days after the memorable Carol Service. Where did all those people come from? How we praised God for a full church on that Sunday evening. It was a moving time for us for other reasons, too. As we sat there and experienced the sense of worship, we were grateful to God that, increasingly, He is giving to us as individuals and as a fellowship, a spirit of praise. This brings great delight to Him as well as to ourselves, so there is rejoicing all round. As we looked, in the candle-light, on the congregation, we were aware that we were surrounded on all sides by those we love and those we have grown to love in the Lord over the years we have been here in Nottingham. We rejoiced that God is drawing us together in a love we did not anticipate when we first moved to Nottingham. How very faithful He is. As we continued to reflect on those who were worshipping with us, we were able to see those whose lives the Lord has touched deeply in recent months. Some have experienced physical healing; others, healing of inner hurts; some have come into a deeper experience of the working of the Holy Spirit in their lives. May we continue to expect more miracles, recognise them when they take place, and give praise to the One who alone is worthy of our praise - JESUS!

have an awareness within ourselves that the Lord who has blessed us in the past so richly has even more for us this year. May that encourage us. How often we are hindrances to receiving all that the heavenly Father has for us His children. Are some of us failing for various reasons to reach out to receive what the Lord is offering to us as a fellowship and as individuals? The verse which we would like to give ourselves and you as we go into the New Year is from Malachi 3. verse 10 "Bring the full tithes and dues to the storehouse and then see if I do not open the floodgates of heaven for you and pour out blessing for you in abundance." May we bring all that we have, all that we are, to the Lord God this year, that He may pour out on us such blessings which we shall scarcely be able to hold.



We personally praise God for sending us Pat (whom we are missing) and then Hilary and now Anne and Judith. They, and our St. John's students have enriched our lives and that of the fellowship. We covet your prayers for continuing unity and support of one another and loving open-ness and that God will give to us a sense of direction for His work here.




from the editor worship

It seemed to me right to acknowledge those feelings because a few of our own people know them only too well - it has been their experience over the years, when changes have been introduced. It is hard to discover that well-loved hymns and well-loved prayers and services are used less frequently, or not at all. Sorrow at such a great loss is inevitable. Those of us who find the changes easy to take, relevant and even beautiful, need to be reminded of the pain of some of our brothers and sisters in Christ. May we enter into that pain with them as changes continue and pray that each one will experience the everlasting love of the Lord here and now - not just in eternity, but through our caring.



Phat is worship





WORSHIP






What would your reaction be, if one Sunday evening, you walked into church and instead of hearing "the playing of the merry organ", you saw three singers, each holding a pair of bronze cymbals standing on the steps at the foot of the chancel? On their left, gathered around the lectern were another eight people each with a harp; and on their right, beneath the pulpit were seven more people including the two church-wardens, strumming away on quitars. And as if that wasn't enough, there were seven vicars, each with a trumpet, standing in the chancel facing the congregation. Finally, keeping this "orchestra" (for want of a better word) in order, there was a man (who understood about music) standing in the nave, dressed in a special costume for the occasion.

I suppose that a natural reaction would be to think the church had jumped a hundred years into the future, or had simply gone berserk! However, the truth would be that it had gone back in time three thousand years to the time of King David of Israel. For this was the ensemble which David brought together that we read about in 1 Chronicles 15:16-28. The Chronicler even tells us what the purpose of this was - "to raise sounds of joy!" I'm sure that they would have succeeded! The Chronicler goes on to tell us that King David had made the instruments with one purpose in mind -


"for praise" (1 Chronicles 23:5). I believe that we can learn a lot by looking at the way Israel worshipped God.

Later on in King Solomon's reign similar things took place. So much so, that when the instruments began to play in praise to the Lord, "the glory of the Lord filled the house of God" (2 Chronicles 5:13-14).



All this took place in Old Testament times. Today we have much, much more for which to praise God. St. Paul gives us one or two guidelines about our use of music: "Be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart, always and for everything giving thanks in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to God the Father" (Ephesians 5:18-21). Here we see worship stemming spontaneously from our relationship with God through Jesus and being inspired by the Holy Spirit. When God the Holy Spirit does lead us I believe He will lead us in a way that is clear and relevant. He will so inspire our praises that when the world looks on it will see that the living Lord Jesus is in our midst.

Worship in spirit



Throughout the world today, the Holy Spirit is leading many of God's people into new spheres of worship. He is inspiring many Christians to write new music for worship; songs which are lyrically scriptural, written in contemporary idiom, for the most part musically good, and worthy to be used in honour and praise of the living God.

I believe that when we, as sons of God, come together under the leading of the Holy Spirit to offer worship and praise to the Lord, when we unashamedly come, as Israel did, to "raise sounds of joy", we too will experience the glory of the Lord filling the house of God.

BACK TO PERU

We would like to thank you all for the friendship and fellowship we have enjoyed with you during the last year and for getting to know you more personally. Thank you for your prayers for us please continue them as we go back to Peru to help you to pray with understanding here are a few facts about us and the part of Peru where we will be living.

WHERE WILL WE LIVE?

We return to Arequipa, second city of Peru with a population of half a million, situated 7,500 feet up in the Andes mountains in a fertile valley in the middle of the desert. It's usually a sunny, dry and invigorating climate - earth tremors are the only drawback! The people are a mixture of Spanish speaking city dwellers and Quechua Indians who are constantly migrating from the mountains to the city.



We will be living in a modern suburb in a threebedroomed 'semi' - a distinctly 'middle-class' area of the town.

WHAT ABOUT THE CHILDREN?

Judi and Claire will be with us and returning to their school, the Colegio Internacional (a Christian school of about 900 pupils, housed in a new

building five minutes walk from our house). There all the teaching is in Spanish and nearly all the children are Peruvian. Judi and Claire will be glad to see their Peruvian friends again, some of whom live in the same road. Pray for them as they adapt to life in Spanish again.


WHAT WILL WE BE DOING?

We will be involved to a greater or lesser extent in the following activities:

- leadership training at all levels for the fortyodd churches in our area. This will probably
 involve: evening Bible schools; Bible teaching
 by extension i.e. the study is done at home
 with monthly visits from the teacher for marking,
 encouragement, etc; shorter courses for church
 elders, women, Sunday School teachers.
- pastoral counselling a big lack in the growing churches of South America.
- production and distribution of Scripture Union notes in simple Spanish.
- neighbourhood Bible studies.
- some limited help in the Colegio Internacional (teaching, morning prayers, administration).
- hospitality visitors come from all over Peru and often other parts of the world too.

In the light of the above list, do pray that God will show us the right priorities and that we may not run round in circles doing everything and getting nowhere! May God help us to see things always through His eyes and to know His method of working. Thank you all once again - we look forward to corresponding with you and getting your news too when we are back in Arequipa.



New Church Electoral Roll

At the end of February 1978 the present Electoral Roll of St. Nicholas Church, which has been in existence since 1972, will cease to have effect. In common with other churches, a new roll must be prepared. Only those who apply to have their names entered will be on the new roll - no names can be carried over from the previous one.

A lay person is entitled to have his name entered on the Electoral Roll of a parish if he:-

- (a) is baptised.
- (b) is a member of the Church of England or of a church in communion with it.
- (c) is 17 or over.
- (d) is either resident in the parish or has habitually attended public worship there for at least 6 months.
- (e) signs the application form.

Also, a person may now have his name entered on any number of church electoral rolls if he is qualified, and no consents by P.C.C.s are necessary for this.

If you wish to be on the new Electoral Roll of St. Nicholas' church, please obtain a form, fill it in and hand it to the secretary, Mrs. Hilary Holden at the Rectory as soon as possible, and in any case no later than 22nd February 1978.

Dear Friends,

A very happy and blessed Christmas to you all ! - Unbelievable that already this is my second Christmas away from home and that this next year should see me back amongst you all: please join me in praying that the Lord will be showing me during the coming months just what His next step for me is - to return here ? go elsewhere ? - stay 'at home' ? At the same time, there's plenty to be praying for in the 'here and now'. We praise the Lord that the school got under way on the official date despite the headmaster's accident. He still has his arm in a sling, but is quite recovered otherwise, and should 'have his arm back' for Christmas. Meanwhile I have had extra administrative responsibilities given to me this term because of his incapacity, and found myself, amongst other things, making the time-table quite a challenge!, but the Lord enabled me to do it, reasonable quickly. Praise the Lord that this year I have had a reduction in my quota of lessons, both from the point of view of hours and also of the number of subjects: now, I am teaching French and Religion to the Pedagogy year and English to 4 classes spread over the top three years. This has allowed more time for administrative matters and also for extra-curricular activities with pupils, staff and folk on the hill.

This term saw the arrival of half-a-dozen new members of staff. We are thankful that there are Christians among them, including the daughter of our Bishop Nkunzumwami. Several members of staff have been meeting - somewhat irregularly - for Bible discussion, this term, and we are praying this will settle down into a serious group for fellowship.

We have had encouragements amongst the pupils too in recent weeks, despite obvious attempts by Satan to thwart the Lord's work.

We have not yet seen the arrival of our new pastor, but a young church teacher, Kovisa, newly out of Bible college, has been helping in the parish and has been well received by the young folk. Then, just this last weekend, when Harold Adeny came back to show films and preach, about 20 youngsters asked for counselling after the service. Please pray for them as you continue to pray for the C.U. groups and a good atmosphere in the school as a whole.

We are back to a continual walking-in of mud to the house with the onset of the rainy season. People were getting desperate for rain, as the season started very late and it was feared there might be a famine. Now everything's a luxurious green again and already the first crops of beans are being garnered. The other day I decided to visit a family who had sent us some beans as a gift. They live just across the valley - about 20 minutes' walk away in the dry season ... but now the valley is flooded and I had to walk round to a built-up road and bridge - giving me over an hour's walk to get there! However, the welcome I received made every step of the way worthwhile!

On the subject of journeys, - Jill Singyard has kindly left her car with me during her furlough, and I'm hoping to use it to run over to Buye for Christmas - to share that joyful season with Karin, Steve and Ann Stordy and their little family, Joel and Bernardette Ceccaldi and their new little baby, and our two new volunteers. There are several singers amongst us - so I'm hopefully taking along a copy of "The Messiah" - just in case'!

Again I wish you all a joyous Christmastide. God bless you.

The Gift of Prophecy

Scripture makes it quite clear that we <u>must</u> weigh

test

prophecy.

1 Cor. 14.29 Let 2 or 3 prophets speak, and let the others weigh what is said."

1 Thess. 5.20-21 "Do not despise prophesying, but test everything."

There are 3 possible sources:-

The Holy Spirit

The man's spirit

the evil spirit.

When we listen to prophecy we must therefore judge whether this is of the Lord.

Of Jer. 14.14 "The prophets are prophesying this in Thy name; I did not send them, nor did I command them or speak to them. They are prophesying to you a lying vision and the deceit of their own minds".

After a prophecy at a Prayer meeting there needs to be a pause for testing.

HOW?

- Is it according to the Word of God? If it is contrary to Scripture it is immediately suspect.
- 2 Is Jesus Christ glorified? In John 4.2-3 - every spirit which does not confess Jesus is not of God."
- 3. Is it edifying? 1 Cor. 14.3
- 4. Is it spoken in love 1 Cor. 13 with patience, kindness, long-suffering etc.
- Is the person exercising the gift in control?
 1 Cor. 14.32.
- 6. What about the life of the person exercising the gift? Matthew 7.15

Beware of false prophets - wolves dressed in sheep's clothing.

True worship

(Part of an article which appeared in Link Mag. The article is written by Robin Toley of CPAS.)

What are the marks of true worship?

How do we give verbal expression to the love we have for God? Jesus summed it up in his conversation with the woman of Samaria: "True worshippers will worship the Father is spirit and in truth."

(John 4.23)

Worship in truth

If we are to worship in truth, then our <u>minds</u> must be involved in what we do. We do not leave our critical faculties at the Church door when we enter. Our minds and our intellect have a vital place in worship. Our worship must be a rational response of love and praise to what we know and believe about God. Otherwise it will just be a superficial, frothy emotionalism. We must beware of worship which is merely emotional aesthetic, ecstatic or ritualistic, although all of these have a place in worship.

There must be a rational content there must be truth in worship and we must worship in a language we can understand

We will never, of course, know God exhaustively, there will always be an element of the mystery of God in our worship, but it must be based on what God has revealed to us. There must be the interaction of the Word of God and our worship of God.

The Bible says:

There must be <u>unity</u> in our relationships with other Christians as we worship with one another.

GOD'S WORD

We must therefore

sort out resentments which we hold (Matt. 5:23)

The Bible also shows us that we must examine our own lives and ask God's forgiveness as we come to worship Him (1 Corinthians 11.28)

We must be living consistent lives in the world, otherwise our worship is mere hypocrisy.

False worship


Jesus severely criticised the Pharisees because they were so concerned with correct forms of worship that in the end the outward ceremonial became more important to them than the inward reality. True worship ,Jesus said, is a matter of the heart and mind, not of the lips(Mark 7.6) Jesus also taught us that worship is the love of the heart towards our Heavenly Father. It therefore follows that if we do not have that love for God, then any outward form of worship will be a mockery of God.

The start of a New Year - and of a new set of Free-will Offering envelopes - gives the Treasurer the opportunity to draw attention to this form of assistance to regular giving.

The new supply of envelopes is available at the back of church - if you have not previously used this method, please take a set and record your name against the corresponding number on the list provided.

The main advantages of the Free-will Offering envelopes are to enable you to budget your giving, and to maintain your weekly offering on occasions when you are not able to get to church.

They're also particularly helpful if you decide to enter into a covenant because payments under this can be made on a weekly basis. May I remind all you tax-payers that for every £1 you contribute the church can claim 54p back from the tax you have paid. Many people are put off by having to sign a form which toys emphasis on 'undertake to pay for a period of seven years' etc., but without discounting the commitment which is implied, may I also assure anybody who is holding back that the covenant can be discontinued within the seven year period if necessary, or transferred for the benefit of another church if you should leave St. Nicholas'.

Let's repeat that - your £1 becomes £1.54p under this arrangement. Why not start 1978 off by asking me for a covenant form?
