Our dear Friends,

We were on holiday in Suffolk. The weather was wet! Even so, the little Church in the delightful village where we were staying was ablaze with colour. Villagers and Church members had united to produce a most imaginative and artistic Wild Flower Festival, and with wild flowers gathered from the hedgerows and heath, had reproduced a floral version of the Pilgrim's Progress. It was a fascinating hour, walking around the Church and admiring their work. Then, in the Church Hall, there were displays by the Brownies and Guides and other members of the congregation. How easy it is, we felt, to experience a much-needed feeling of belonging if one lives in a community as compact as that rather remote village near the Suffolk coast. But what is the purpose of a City Centre Church? Is there a future and a purpose for such a ministry? If we did not believe there was a purpose for a Church like ours, we should not be here! Way back in the late Spring, the PCC set aside a Quiet Day to consider the complexities of the ministry of Christian work and fellowship in City centre Nottingham. In the Watmough's lovely home in Leicestershire, we gave ourselves time to "listen to God" about His will for the future of the work here. It seemed, from this time of listening that a three-fold purpose emerged: It seemed that the Church was to be a place where people could come for spiritual refreshment and renewal and not all of these

would be members of the Church. This does seem to be happening. Very frequently these days, we find visitors coming to worship with us as it were "on holiday" to be refreshed and renewed, so that they can go back to their own demanding situations strengthened. Pray that as a Church we we may be equipped to minister to such people. Some small groups in the Church are also seeing this as an important part of their ministry. Coffee Club and the Mid-week lunch have long been places where Christians from other Churches have come to both give and receive and it is exciting to see this two way ministry growing and developing.

A second function which seemed to emerge quite powerfully at the Quiet Day was that of St. Nic's being a place of commissioning. Many of us have important and responsible jobs in the City. The Church is the place where we receive spiritual food (in the form of teaching on Sundays, Tuesdays and in the small groups) but it is also the spiritual home from which we are sent into our secular employment to live and witness for Christ. How many of us "waste" time looking for opportunities to witness for the Lord in our spare time, when He has given us a vital and unique commission in the place where we work. We don't need to look for opportunities, they surround us every day! There seemed to be a warning that this kind of witnessing would be very costly to those who took the challenge seriously, but as the writer to the Hebrews tells us, the suffering we have yet experienced is really minimal when we consider His suffering for us.

Thirdly, the Church was to become a place of "belonging". How? That question may well be asked when we live miles apart and when the congregations are so big it is impossible to know everyone. And yet that feeling of belonging to one another is beginning to take place. Many of us found that in the small groups on Tuesday nights, we belonged to one another in a new way

as we studied together and shared with one another and in most groups, there was real sadness when the time had come to move to another group. The Area Link Groups have also contributed greatly to this feeling of "belonging" and in the Women's Fellowship that feeling grows with each meeting so that when someone is absent they are missed. At this time of year, newcomers will be joining the Church. They seek for somewhere to "belong" in the strange, bewildering city of Nottingham. Once again, may we ask for sacrificial caring for those who come to us locking for a spiritual home.

Underlying all of the purposes for our fellowship mentioned above, was the assumption that we existed not just for curselves, but that others might hear the Good News of the Gospel. Two things have thrilled us in recent months: the zeal of some who really want to reach others for the Lord and the spiritual hunger expressed by some who have recently been coming to us. Perhaps the most humbling and exciting thing in the ministry is to encounter someone who is hungrily seeking for God. There are some among us now. Praise God!

It was while we were away on holiday that a letter arrived from the Bishop agreeing to allow Martin and Sue Winbolt-Lewis to work with us here in the parish. For us, this is good news indeed. As we have watched the work expand in every area, under God's guidance, we have found our own tiredness level increasing as the months go by. Even with Anne and Judith's loyal and faithful support we were not coping with the work load. Some time ago, it seemed as if God was indicating that we should consider inviting Martin and Sue to join us and we rejoice deeply that it is now possible to do that. They are no strangers to some of us. Martin did his month "placement" with us when he was a student at St. John's and during that time he lived with us in Maid Marian Way. Some members of the

Women's Fellowship have specially happy memories of Sue. In pouring rain, we visited the home of her parents in Hope only a few days before Sue & Martin's wedding and Sue and her mother calmly entertained us to tea in their lovely home! Right now we are locking for accomodation for them. The Bishop has made it clear that we must support them ourselves as a Church for there is no money available for them from the Diocese. This will mean an increase in giving to the Assistant Ministry Fund. Some are giving to this in a sacrificial way already. If you haven't vet felt it right to contribute, may we ask you to prayerfully consider whether this might be something God would have you to do. Di Bratt is the person to see and all giving to that Fund is entirely confidential. Gifts large and small are always most welcome. We believe that to maintain the growth in the Church at this moment, it is essential to have the sort of help which Martin and Sue can cive.

However, the Bishop has made it clear that with the current shortage of Curates, it will not always be possible for us to have a Curate. In fact, when Martin leaves, it is unlikely that he will be replaced by another Curate. To quote the Bishop: "You must have your laity so trained that the Church can cope with only a Rector". This fitted in very much with the thinking of the Staff about the desirability to use many of cur gifted lay people more effectively. Twelve men have been invited to meet together on Tuesday evenings, to think through the planning of the Church services and strategy and we hope that they will be used eventually to teach, to minister at some of the services in a variety of ways and gradually be set free to use their gifts to the benefit of all of us. Would you especially remember this group in your prayers.

Many members of the Fellowship have made it their responsibility to pray for the many camps and houseparties being held this summer and also for the Cambridge mission to Overseas students. I wish you could have travelled with us the other day. We were bringing a car load of teenagers back from a trip to Dertyshire. They had been thrilled by all that they had learned during these summer months. Working in Cambridge and being at houseparties had made a profound effect on them. One of them said: "For me, Christianity has fallen into place this summer. I'm suddenly realising what it is all about." Praise God! Pray for these young people as they go back to their schools and Colleges that they may have the courage to be witnesses and leaders for the Lord there too.

So we move into another busy autumn with its many new opportunies. Reflecting on that well-known and well-loved chapter in 1 Corinthians recently, I have been impressed by the words of Paul: Love.....seeks not her own. (1 Cor.13) As we meet up again, seeking to love one another as the Lord has commanded us to do, maybe each of us could use that phrase as a personal motto. What a difference it would make to the fellowship.

MRS MATTHEWS

It is with regret that we have to record the recent and unexpected deaths of Mrs Ivy Matthews and Mrs Olive Ursell.

Mrs Matthews died on July 10th in her eightyfourth year at her daughter's home in Yorkshire. It is six years since she left Nottingham to share in the home, love and comfort of her family but her prayers and thoughts were very frequently with us at St Nicholas' and she kept marvellously up to date with our news by means of letters from her friends here and by receiving the Church Magazine regularly. She loved to return to Nottingham at least once a year to stay with George and Maisie Ingram and to renew old friendships. Members of the Womens Fellowship will recall how much she enjoyed the trip to the Major Oak last year followed by tea in the garden at Tom and Sylvia's. She was so bright and so delighted to be with us all again.

Her late husband, George, was Rector's Warden of St Nicholas' for over twenty years and during that long spell of office, he could always be certain of the full support of his wife in all of his duties. Apart from their love for the Church, they shared a common concern and interest for a local boys' home acting as relief houseparents so that Staff could enjoy days off and holidays.

It was good to know that her illness was so short and that she was surrounded by love and care to the end. Many of her friends in the Church made Sunday 23rd July a special day in her memory by arranging the flowers in Church and it was lovely that some of her relatives from Yorkshire could worship with us that evening.

It was characteristic that one of those arranging flowers in memory of Mrs Matthews was Mrs Ursell. It was a great shock to all of us to learn of her death on July 26th. She was a regular member of our Evening congregation and loved to attend Women's Fellowship regularly. She first came to St Nicholas' in the '60's. A friend invited her to come along to a service, she came, liked us and stayed becoming an enthusiastic member of the Basford Home Area Group.

She was a loving, gentle person with great compassion for her neighbours who lived alone. She made time to visit and sit and talk with them and was doing just that only a few hours before she died. She will be greatly missed from our fellowship, since she was greatly loved by all of us. One of our last memories of her will be the sheer delight she expressed while in Derbyshire with the W.F. in July. She loved that walk through the fields and tea in the garden at Holloway not to mention the ice-cream on the way home! Little did we realise that within a few weeks she would suffer a stroke and die so quickly.

Preaching at her funeral, the Rector rightly said:" We have only ever heard good spoken of her". Praying with her on one occasion, God seemed to give us a verse for her containing a promise:
"I have written your name on My palm". How that verse brought deep joy and comfort through some of the struggles and disappointments which she bore so bravely. Thank God for the Resurrection and that she is now "with Him" which for her is far better. But the pain for those left behing is intense. Please pray for her family at this difficult time.

I'm also thrilled to be linked with St Nic's, and through them to the Chinese Church and I look forward to all that the coming months hold.

I wept as I rememberd how often you and I Had tired the sun with talking and sent him down the sky.


And now thou art lying, my oldest friend and best


The Park South: Tom and Kathleen Robinson

"I'm in my third year at St John's and intend to be ordained next summer. This year I have had a break from College to broaden my experience slightly. I have spent most of it studying in North

Greece. I had a kind of exchange scholarship to get to know the Eastern Orthodox Church. This involved living in an Orthodox monastery for nearly six months and a little travelling. It all sounds rather bizarre, but I found the whole thing really amazing. I found a lot of Orthodoxy hard to cope with, but was very aware of God's help in understanding it. He also gave all kinds of unexpected things in terms of fellowship, friends, prayer and reading etc. I hope, too, that that He was able to use me.

Since getting back to England, I have spent two interesting months working as a filing clerk in an insurance office in London.

Oh yes! Before going to St John's, I did a Classics degree at Oxford, which meant I was able to learn Modern Greek a bit more easily and appreciate the country. It was a great experience being a "stupid" foreigner for a change!

Tomorrow I'm off to lead a Houseparty in Wales!
