Dear David and Joyce,

It has been nearly a year now that I was able to join in at St Nic's Houseparty, and see quite a number of friends there. It was a thrilling time, especially as I also met Doris, as another German Christian. I have only seen her once in Tubingen since then, as I don't live there any more.

This year was very busy as I start d my teacher's training in a small, lovely town, Besigheim. It's surrounded by vineyards and has lovely old buildings (in some ways similar to Tubingen) Because it is small I found it really difficult to get to know people during the first few months, thought I joined the Church choir and play in a little Chamber orchestra. I missed my Christian friends and felt very isolated at times. Also I was a bit afraid of teaching because I didn't know how I would manage. But I learnt a lot during these first few months. I can understand people much better who feel depressed. Well, after Easter I felt much better, because I got to know some Christians who go to a Bible Study which I joined of course. This gave me new strength and encouragement. One couple who go to this Bible Study have a vineyard, so I spent a whole day in September picking grapes. (It was great!)

Teaching was very hard at the beginning, but now I really enjoy doing all kinds of sport with the kids and te ching English grammar and literature. A few wek weeks ago I did a project on Northern Ireland which was r ally interesting (hard work though). Some of the older (and younger) pupils are really keen on learning and using the language. I'm glad I do get on with the kids really well and am happy that God can use me as He wants. Even some people in Germany would disagree, I think we have many possibilities to reach our young people, they are quite open for talks and we as teachers should take these chances.

In September our school got an assistant teacher from Australia. We got on really well from the first minute and soon found out that we were both Christians. We are both really thrilled that God provi es friends when we need them . She also comes to our Bible Study. When I took her home to my parents a few weeks ago, we also found out that she lives ten minutes walk from my brother in Melbpurne (How small the world is!)

Thank you all for all your prayers which have been a tremendous help during this year. I still feel a memebr of St Nic's and hope to come to Nottingham around E_a ster. Will there probably be anybody to put up with a poor little shy, lonely German girl for a few days??!!

I wish you all and the whole of the St Nic's Family a very happy Christmas and God's richest blessing in 1980.

Dear Joyce and David,

Greetings to both of you and your family in Jesus Name. How are you ? I am well. Still trusting in the Lord each day of my life.

I have been back in Malaysia now for almost 3 months and time really flies by. Praise the Lord. Do you remember Joyce. I shared with you about the Lord's conviction laid on my heart about serving the church here. The Lord really confirmed it for me on my 2nd and 3rd day back to Penang when I visited the Methodist Church I go to. I didn't approach the leaders but they came and shared with me that they were praying for readers to help them. It's amazing how the Lord can prepare me to do all these tasks awaiting for me to do in this church while I was in Nottingham. Let me name you some of the Lord's work here. I am helping the Girls' Brigade in their spiritual growth and I'm reading in their weekly devotion. It's a group of 20 + young girls and some of them are very keen to know more about the Lord. In a month's time I am taking 3 G.B. companies of girls about 40-50 of them up the Penang Hill and stay in a bungalow for a few days. My main aim is to know the girls better and be able to share with them on a closer level about the Lord. I've had a few speaking appointments mainly to young people. We have a large group called the Methodist Youth Fellowship of 60-70 boys and girls. At one meeting I spoke about "How to live a Christian life in an un-christian world." I praised God for wisdom and strength when preparing for these talks. It is Christ that I want to glorify and it's Christ that I want these young people to see. After the talk, I counselled some

of them who had some problems and difficulties. One of them sneaked out of her house early morning on Sundays to go to church so that her family won't know, because they object to her faith. You know I went through this path before in my life and I could feel for her and be able to encourage her in her faith in the Lord and to wait upon the Lord for the right time to tell her parents. T was also asked to speak at a meeting of which my sister is the chairman of this Advisory group. I even helped in the Sunday School, teaching the 10 - 12 years old. It's really a delight to me when I asked them to say a short prayer to Jesus (they never did it before in Sunday School) and their prayers were so beautiful and meaningful. No wonder Jesus loves children so much and so often uses children as an example.

My present biggest task is gathering a group of young people to prepare them for caroling. Yesterday we had our first meeting and we had 65 young people. There will be more joining in the next few practices especially from the 5th formers and 6th formers (O'level and A'level students). I am starting the meeting with a short devotion and prayer and then the practice, teaching them their parts (eg. soprano, alto, bass, tenor) and then end the meeting with prayer cells. I hope to achieve a praying youth group with God's help to pray for this church. I feel that the elders in our church are more hearers than doers of the word. They depend more on their own strength and intelligence than depending on God. The money talk seems to be slipping in everywhere. Even some of the youth leaders who complain so much and misusing their own authority eg. ordering others around than they themselves do the serving. I do pray that while I am here, I may be able to share Christ's example of leadership "I come to serve and not to be served". I know that the Lord has prepared many more things for me to do. I believe that I must keep looking at Jesus and

me a branch keep receiving the resources from the True Vine. Joyce, remember you share with the fellowship this passage on the True Vine and one verse particularly speaks to me even now as I serve the Lord here. It says ..."for apart from me (Jesus) you can do nothing" John 15 : 5. Indeed how very true of it. He must reign over all the tasks that He gives to me, after all they are God's work.

My family is still very hard and cold to the Gospel. I seem to have changed, more on the quiet and serious side according to what they said. Sometimes I believe that God can even speak through me even though I don't giggle as much as I used to. Their worship to the idols still the same or if not worst. Sometimes they play the tape with the chants (prayer) to the idols. My sister and I do pray together. My youngest brother is very open to the gospel and I've shared with him already. Will keep praying that he will accept Christ too.

Even though I am here and Milton is in Nottingham. I praise the Lord for keeping us and strengthening us in our relationship. The engagement ring I am wearing is a help too in my sharing and counselling. I don't worry about Milton because I know that the Lord is looking after him and so is He who is looking after me here. We praise the Lord too for all that He has done for us and we pray that we will remain in the centre of God's will for us, and Christ as our first lover.

Please do pray for me while I am here that I remain faithful to Christ and that I will do what He wants me to do. And in the midst of all these works, I can find time to spend with the Lord to be recharged and ready to serve Him.

I do want to thank you all for your patience

in reading my long-winded letter. Sorry for my scribbling. My love to the Church members.

By the Rev. Theodore L. Guyler, D.D., January 1883!

The opening work of this year witnesses a concert of prayer every day throughout Christendom. This "week of prayer", which is now so widely observed, owes its origin to the suggestion of Dr. Morrison and the Rev. Mr. Newton, of the "Loodiana Presbytery", in Northern India. The original purpose of the service, as set forth by those missionaries, was to pray that "the Holy Spirit may be poured out on all flesh." It contemplated no more than this; but in this it aimed to secure the most vital and precious gift that could be bestowed from Heaven. There was no presumption in this, for our Lord had promised this glorious gift to those that seek aright, and declared that "your Heavenly Father will give the Holy Spirit to them that ask it."

THE SPIRIT CAME

When we pray for the Holy Spirit understandingly, we do not ask for a mere influence. We ask for the presence and power of a Person, the third Person of the Divine Trinity, who possesses the attributes of personality as completely as Jesus Christ did when He assumed the human form. The Holy Spirit - we may say it with profoundest reverence - is the executive of the Godhead. Through Him the efficiency of the Godhead upon human souls is exercised. He is the revealer of all vital and needful truth. He is the author of that wonderful Word whose penmen He inspired. Is my Bible a light unto my feet and a lamp unto my path? He kindled the lamp. The Holy Spirit gives me discernment to apprehend aright the great truths of that Word of Life. He convicts every sinner of his guilt and danger who is genuinely convicted and broght to true repentance. The most powerful sermon of a Whitfield or a Spurgeon would not move one solitary sinner one inch toward Heaven without the agency of

the Holy Spirit. When the Apostle addressed his fellow-Christians, he said to them: "You hath He quickened" i.e., to you hath He given life from the dead. If I am a Christian, with any power for good in this world and any hope of glory in the next, it is because the Divine Spirit regenerated me. To Him I owe my new birth, just as veritably (though not in the same way) that I owe my natural birth to my parents. In my hours of conflict and sore trial, He is my Comforter. If He dwells within me, then I possess peace and submission to God, and fervent love to my fellow-men, and patience and every other needful and beautiful grace. Without Him I am nothing; with Him I have power. All this being true, can there be any object of prayer that is even comparable to this gift of the Spirit of God? Not only for the opening week of the year, but through its every week the foremost request for all of us should be:



The New Testament teaches us that the only two agents that are to bring this sin-smitten world back to God are the Holy Spirit and the Christian Church; but the Church without the Spirit is as utterly powerless to move itself or move others as a locomotive is to propel a train until a flame is kindled under its boiler. Here lies the secret of the inefficiency that so painfully affects and cripples our pulpits and our churches. Here lies the real cause of the lamentable lack of conversions which is now so much commented on in every quarter. We do not read that one of Christ's Apostles ever converted a single soul until the gift of the Spirit had been granted; but when Peter (who had been reconverted himself) received the power from on high, he brought three thousand to Christ by one discourse! That master workman in the salvation of souls, harles G. Finney, acknowledged that sometimes his preaching was as useless as sounding brass; and the reason was that he relied on himself, and not on the Almighty Spirit. Then came what he called a "breaking down before God", when he renounced

sin and self-reliance, and cried out for a fresh baptism of power from on high. When he became filled with the Holy Spirit, the weight of his spear was a weaver's beam and his words were clothed with thunder.

This was in the direct line of Scripture injunction and experience. The command to the apostolic Christians was: "Be ye filled with the Spirit". Two bodies cannot occupy the same spirit at the same time, and, if our hearts are fulled with the Spirit of God, there is no room for the areedy and godless world. Unbelief flees away, like the darkness at the coming of the dawn. Every grace thrives and grows. We are inspired with tender sympathy for others and become intensely solicitous for those who are living without God and dying without hope. When we are filled with the Spirit we do not need to be drummed or scolded to a prayer-service, or to be baited to God's house by some prodigy in the pulpit or some novelty that piques curiosity. When filled with the Spirit, the purse opens easy at the touch of charity, the tongue is unloosed to speak for Christ, and what we say and what we do is attended with a supernatural power. To be filled with the Spirit is a revival.

At this moment this wonder-working Spirit of God. on whom our very lives depend, is absolutely "grieved" away and "quenched" in too many of our churches. "Ye do resist the Holy Ghost is the tremendous indictment that lies against many a pastor and church now cursed with barrenness. Such churches, by quenching the heavenly fire, become like an ice-field of Siberia. The one hope and the only possible hope of all such Christians is in a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit. This must be sought. A few persons in every church may inaugurate a new state of things by putting themselves in the right posture before God. There may be a genuine and soul-renewing revival in any church, if only a few persons honestly, humbly, and earnestly prepare the way. There must be a clearing out before there is a filling up; a breaking-down before God, before there is a building-up into new dimensions and beauty. When even three or four penitent Christians

thirst for the Holy Spirit, and cry out for Him, and make room for Him, He will hear the prayer of faith and come. When the sun comes, then comes the morning. The gift of the Holy Spirit is (since Calvary) the mightiest, richest, holiest, and most unspeakably precious gift that the Godhead can bestow. It is within our reach today. Shall we have it? And, having it, keep it?

"Miracle on Death Row"

by Judge Kermit Bradford.

I am not the sort of person who spends whole evenings in reading and I'm generally tooshattered to read by the time I get to bed, so most of my reading of this book has taken place during break and lunch times in my civil service job! That is an indication of the raciness and readability of the book, not a reflection on the length of the lunch breaks!

This true life drama is the story of a guy called T.C. Callahan who is put on trial by the U.S. State for a murder which he claims he did not commit. His defence lawyer (the author, Kermit Bradford, nothing to do with the green frog in "The Muppetts !) becomes increasingly convinced of Callahan's inocence. Suspense and tension mount as both men (accused and defendant) miraculously become Christians and consequent further miracles occur. This book challenges us not to lead schizophrenic Christian lives! being holy and helpful on Sundays (even weekday evenings), but being guilty of leaving Jesus outside of our work places, relationships and other mis-tuned "secular" areas of life. This book also provoked me to think about other areas of life, such as justice, crime, the sanctity of life, capital punishment. It's a book I would strongly recommend. It makes a good present for non-Christian relatives and friends, or if you can't afford the 90p, it is possible to ask the local library to purchase it. That adds another

readable Christian book to their repertoire! Incidentally, I've found reading a Christian book like this at work has given unexpected opportunities to witness. Praise the Lord!
