




"Where've you been ?"

"What have you been doing?"

Our dear Friends,

these are the questions that we were asked frequently when we returned from our three-month study leave in mid-August. By way of response, we quoted the advice we were given by the person supervising our time away: "Just let the grass grow funder your feet." In other words, learn to 'just be', rather than seeking to achieve, and this is what we did for most of the time.



Based at our cottage in Derbyshire, we enjoyed time together in our outstanding summer. We licked the garden into shape, tramped the hills, re-evaluated our ministry and took time and space for leisurely prayer.

At the weekends, David travelled to various churches which face similar challenges to the ones we face in St. Nic's: challenges produced by growth and the particular problems with which city-centre churches are presented. He also saw churches with a similar vision to remain true to the Bible's teaching, while being open to the leading and ministry of the Holy Spirit. Among others, he visited Holy Trinity, Brompton; St. Aldate's, Oxford; St. Thomas', Crookes (Sheffield) and St. Michael-le-Belfrey, York. He not only attended services but also talked with members of staff and other leaders, returning stimulated and with much food for thought.

Learning Together

During the final month of our sabbatical, we both attended a course on spirituality in North Wales. In many ways, this was the highlight of our time away. We became students together, learned and worshipped together, saw Wales at its best in wonderful weather and, as it were, returned to the Source of Life, God, together. While we were there, we were reminded very forcibly of the power of prayer which gives birth to all ministry which bears fruit for God.

As a result of all this, we have returned to St. Nic's refreshed and renewed: in body, mind and spirit. Our home-coming has been extremely happy - helped by the flowers, letters, cards, hugs, kisses and the verbal 'Welcome Back'. Thank You.

Praying for a Vision

Our longing for the autumn is that the prayer life of St. Nic's should be strengthened: which means deepening our personal prayer so that our prayer together may be more rich and real. Even though many of us (all of us?) find prayer difficult, at the same time there is a tremendous hunger in the hearts of hundreds of Christians for a prayer life that is vital and vibrant. This is where we begin. The vision for the future will unfold from that.



WHAT'S YOUR IMAGE?

DURING the coming three months no part of mainland Britain and Ireland will be far from a major new show being taken on the road by Tear Fund, the Christian overseas relief and development agency.

'Broken Image' weaves together film with live performances of songs, poetry and mime. The film was shot on location in the Philippines, and the live performances have been created by the artists after spending time with the poor people of that country.

Tour director Steve Rand says, 'These people, made in the image of God, live lives broken by poverty and injustice'; one location, for instance, was Smoky Mountain in Manila, where 4,000 families earn a living by scavenging on the municipal rubbish tip.

However, Steve adds, 'The evenings' presentations will show that we may have an image of the poor in the Third World which needs to be broken...the evenings will be both entertaining and challenging.'

BROKEN IMAGE



The video 'Broken Image' was shot entirely on location in the Philippines and draws on material produced for the tour. It is not a video of the tour presentation itself. The hour-long video consists of four 15 minute discussion starter programmes specially designed for youth groups and house groups. It comes complete with a 16 page study guide and will be available price £12.95 from 1st September.

The idea of a new church magazine was first raised at link-group in which the strength of community of a church was discussed. We came to the conclusion that St. Nic's does not rate very highly in this area, one of the major problems being the lack of communication between different areas of the church. From this basis, the major aims of this publication are as follows:

Aims

In general:

To build up the community of St. Nic's by informing, encouraging

and providing a platform for communication.

More specifically:

- To inform people of what is happening in St. Nic's in more detail than is possible in the pew-slip. We would like to publish news of the many groups that exist to promote communication and encourage people to look beyond their present horizons.
- To spread ideas on practical ways of being Salt and Light in your secular life; at work, at home, in the pub. Also to increase members' awareness of activities in which others are involved as a result of their faith, eg. Macedon Trust, Prison Visiting, Tear Fund, Keep Sunday Special, Community Care Groups...
- To foster acquaintance with the leaders and officers of the church. 'Who is on the PCC? What does the treasurer look like?'
- To enable items of personal news and testimony to be made available to a wider audience. We are very keen to print testimonies they are glorifying to God, they build faith and they encourage all who read them. If God answers one of your prayers, tell us about it!

A few notes on 'Editorial policy'

While a parish magazine may contain news of secular events within the local area, the Editors feel that these would not be appropriate for a church magazine covering such a wide area as this one. Items for the diary and noticeboard as well as articles should be at least vaguely church related. Thus if your choir is performing Handel's Messiah, a religious work, we would be pleased to mention it. The Marriage of Figaro, however, might receive the Editor's 'Blue Pencil'.

Items of personal news are of great value in promoting a sense of community and thus, space permitting, are almost always assured of a place, as are jokes and other humorous items.

You can be part of the team.

If you feel that any of the following 'Sits Vac' could be you, we would be delighted to hear from you, not because we're too lazy to do the jobs ourselves, but because we would like to see as many people as possible actively involved in the production and distribution of the magazine. Another way of improving community within the church.

Family Puzzle Time - Would you like to supply puzzles and artwork on a regular or occasional basis? This job is great fun.

- Front Cover If you think that you could design a better cover than the present one, perhaps a seasonal one, send it in. (A4 size, please)

- Mole We need a spy in each of the groups in St. Nic's, to keep us informed of what's going on. If you are a member of a group which has no mole, contact us and become a roving reporter.
- Folding and Collating If this is something that you would like to do, then it would reduce production costs.

Renewing your Relationship with God

A Three-Week Course on Spirituality

The course is for St. Nic's people only. The dates are November 1st, 8th, 15th and numbers are limited to 40. The cost, including meals and handouts will be £15 per person and early application should be made to the Church Office.

sum of money to make it possible for people to attend such events. He would be delighted to know that his money is being used!

A Week of Guided Prayer

Parishes all over England are marvelling at the way God works in the lives of individuals and consequently in the life of the Church through weeks of guided prayer. Again the aim is to put each person who attends in touch with a method of prayer which is appropriate for them at this moment in time.

The week begins with a short meeting after church on the evening of Sunday, November 19th when teaching on prayer will be given. Each person then commits him/herself to pray for thirty minutes each day during the coming week and to a meeting with a prayer-guide for up to thirty minutes each day. 

It feels as though we're nearly there, we are now packed up and only one week to go until we leave for Youth With A Mission (YWAM) in Holland on 25th September. I guess we've really only just begun!

It is now five years since Jan and I met on a YWAM outreach in Nottingham, when we were camped out in St. Nic's Church Hall. As we stepped out for the Lord in this way, he revolutionised our lives and the calling to fulltime mission was very strong indeed.

Vision

We're now married and five years older - but no grey hairs yet! We have both completed professional qualifications, Jan as a physiotherapist and myself as an accountant. Whilst the vision has ebbed and flowed in that time, it has always remained very much with us and now seems to be the right time to go.

We have both given up our jobs

and are to commence a Discipleship Training School (DTS) with YWAM in Heerde, Holland. This briefly comprises six months of training in two parts. The lecture phase runs from September to December and includes teaching and ministry on subjects such as: knowing God, relationships, spiritual warfare, repentance and restitution, etc. The main emphasis in this period is on getting right with the Lord and on building Christian character in order to reach out to a lost world.

The second phase, January to March 1990, will be in another country reaching out with the message of the gospel. This will include street evangelism and drama (gulp!), intercession and help on practical projects which YWAM and local churches are undertaking in the area.

Testing the Call

We see the period on the DTS as a time to test God's call to 'full-time' Christian work, and as a time of training in the ways of God. We currently anticipate applying to work with YWAM full-time in April 1990, but await the Lord's will on this.

We would appreciate prayer for the following:

- Leaving families who do not know the Lord, that they might have the grace to accept what we are doing.
- Wisdom and courage as we face the challenge of Living by Faith', financially. While we have the bulk of finance needed, we still require significant funds to be able to pay the DTS fees. Please pray with us, that God would provide the money.
- Future ministry, that we would find our place in his army.



Joshua told the people of Israel to choose whether or not they would serve God. Follow the lines to find which of the Israelites choose to follow God.




Joshua told the Israelites to march seven times around the city of Jericho. March round and use the code to find out what the Israelites said when they had learned more about God.

What is a Synod?


The parish of St. Nicholas' is one of fifteen churches forming the Nottingham Central Deanery Synod. The clergy are automatically part of the Synod together with the elected members from the individual parishes. The Synod comprises about eighty people, both lay and clergy, although there has never been a meeting where all were present. The Nottingham Central Deanery includes churches in the east of the city centre, the Meadows, Sneinton, St. Ann's, Mapperley and parts of Radford. There is a heavy bias towards the inner-city and many Urban Priority Areas are covered.

There are seventeen Deaneries in the Southwell Diocese and some members of each deanery are elected to the diocesan Synod. Some members of this are similarly elected to General Synod.

Back to the Deanery Synod. Lay members of St. Nics are very active, holding between them the responsibilities as Lay Chairperson, Treasurer and chairperson of the Deanery Outreach Committee, (more of this next time). The representatives are also automatically members of their respective PCCs, together with the other elected members.

This then is a brief precis of the Deanery Synod. More of its activities in the next issue and watch out for reports in forthcoming issues of the magazine.

Footprints in Nick!

he only other time they'd been so quiet and attentive was during the Liverpool-Everton match", remarked an assistant governor at Risley Remand Centre following

Footprints' performance of Alan Mac-Donald's play 'Borstal Boy'.

Media Coverage

Recent media coverage

of the roof-top protests at 'Grisly' Risley served to focus public attention on Britain's prison service. Reports of overcrowding, staff shortages and poor morale flared into headlines of violence and destruction, symptoms of anger and despair that imprison many, and from which there seems to be no escape. Footprints' twelve-venue tour to a variety of institutions arose from the belief, expressed by Roy Catchpole on whom 'Borstal Boy' is based, that "whatever the system that encloses individuals, however oppressive it is, there is freedom, real freedom through Christ": the response to the play by inmates at Risley and elsewhere revealed a hunger for this real freedom.

Jesus - The Convict

Borstal Boy' tells the true story of Anglican vicar Roy Catchpole who, as a teenager, became involved in crime and subsequently spent time in borstal and prison. Thinking that he may never be able to leave his past behind, Roy examines the claims of fellow 'convict' Jesus Christ, through

whom he finds his "key to freedom". As the one-act play was originally devised with secondary schools in mind, it took two particularly success-

ful 'one-offs' at Nottingham Prison and Hatfield Youth Custody Centre to prompt the decision to tour prison institutions. The 'in' jokes in the script received approval as never before, but also it seemed that inmates really identified with the situations that Roy found himself in, and the feelings he experienced. The Footprints team, comprising Bridget Daw, Fred Denno, Liz Moody and Simon Whittaker were challenged by the depth of the questions posed by inmates during the discussion times on those occasions. and therefore approached the concept of a tour specifically for prisons with a mixture of excitement and trepidation.



Suspiciously Supernatural

Spread across three weeks in July, the tour incorporated a range of establishments, from fairly highsecurity prisons to open and relatively relaxed young offenders' institutions and this meant that every performance was different. The kind of welcome enjoyed by the team on their arrival ranged from the suspicious ("How Christian are you lot then ?") to the supernatural ("The fact that we got you in was nothing short of a miracle"). On the latter occasion, it was not until a security bargain was struck (threechaplains-in-the-chapel-and-one-officeron-the-landing) that the performance was allowed to go ahead.

Security

Security procedures were generally time-consuming, and one young offenders' institution nearly prevented a performance when one wing of the building was searched for a hacksaw blade. The size of the audience was also quite unpredictable. Footprints' arrival at Liverpool was preceded by the moving of around a hundred inmates to another prison. whilst the audience of seven 'lifers' for the performance at Sudbury Prison was explained by the somewhat embarrassed chaplain as being due to the showing of the Satanist film "Carrie" elsewhere in the building.

"You're Normal!"

Distractions aside, prison audiences were for the most part very appreciative indeed, giving the play itself a good hearing, and taking part in the discussion times afterwards. The older audiences in particular enjoyed the performance - at one prison, every single joke met with uproarious laughter - and individuals seemed eager to chat with the team afterwards. Many good conversations took place between inmates and actors, with opportunities for the team to share their own faith with interested prisoners, one of whom remarked, most gratifyingly, "You're normal, not saying Jesus after every word". At both Strangeways and Liverpool, Footprints' visit had been preceded by transmissions from Billy Graham's Mission '89 and the team were delighted that "Borstal Boy' constituted a 'follow-up' event, albeit by coincidence.

Difference

Prison Staff were most appreciative of the visit, and a governor at Strangeways who had seemed fairly suspicious of this unknown Christian theatre company, commented "We would have liked you to have had more time to mix informally with the audience and take the message of the play forward in that way by discussion". A Governor in Wakeful comparing Footprints' performance to that of another theatre company who had

recently visited the prison, said, "the big difference between you and them was that in your performance there was joy".

God's Faithfulness

A big Thank You to everyone who prayed for the tour, and to those who gave towards the cost of getting it on the road. Through the generosity of our supporters and four grant-making trusts, the whole venture broke even, and we thank God for his faithfulness in initiating and seeing through the tour. Another tour is planned for February/March 1990 - watch this space!




