What is the Place of Women in the Church?

A Sermon Sequel on 1 Timothy 2:11-15

hat a lot these verses have to answer for! Just what did Paul mean by it all? What is the place of women in the church?

The main thrust of this letter to Timothy calls to order the excess of false teachers. It tells them to settle down to a quiet and peaceful existence, living out lives of godliness and holiness. Within this context, Paul addresses specific problems, leading us to v11:

'A woman should learn in quietness and full submission'.

Affirming Women

This indicated a major step forward in accepting women into the Christian

A woman should learn in quietness and full submission



Church - Paul is here affirming she should be allowed to learn - but that she should do so in an attitude of quietness and full submission to God, just as everybody else was expected to learn.

Stillness or Silence?

The word for 'quietness' here is the same used in v2, and in 1Thess. 4:11, 1 Pet. 3:4, and many other places - implying an attitude of tranquillity, in the

sense of 'Be still and know that I am God' (Ps.46:10).

A translation truer to the meaning would therefore be: 'Let a woman be a learner under tranquil conditions inwardly and outwardly, showing attentiveness to

the received teaching.' It is an invalid leap to assume that this verse means that women should be submissive to their husbands!

Women in Authority?

v12: 'I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man: she must be silent' Elsewhere Paul commends women who were al-

A woman must be silent

ready in teaching and authoritative positions. In Acts 18:24-26, Priscilla, a leader


of a house-church in Ephesus (Rom.16:3-5), taught Apollos, who went on to become an apostle. For other women he commended in leadership see Rom.16:1-3 and Phil.4:2-3. Timothy himself was taught by his mother and grandmother. So Paul cannot here have been generally forbidding women to teach - or what was poor Timothy supposed to say to his leader Priscilla?

From The Pulpit

The Greek for 'teach' here, is usually used in a context linked to the content f the teaching, not just to the act of aching. So it is very likely that Paul

was telling them that the women were not to teach these things - i.e. He here is forbidding women to teach a wrong doctrine (cf 1 Tim1:3-4 and Titus 1:9-14) In Ephesus at the time it seems that some of the false teach-

> ing was turning Biblical teaching on its head. One strand was that Eve was the source of all life, and man came out of woman. It may well have been this teaching that Paul was writing against.



No Discrimination

This interpretation is backed by what he writes in 2Tim.2:2:

'Pass on to reliable people {not men, as in the NIV !} what you have learned from me through many witnesses so that they in turn will be able to teach others' - he makes no discrimination here.

I do not permit a woman to have authority over a man

'Authority over a man'. If this was taken as it has sometimes been interpreted then all women in leadership anywhere in society should step down! But this word for authority is used nowhere else in the New Testament, so Paul may have been making a special point by using it, but we don't know what the point was! The

context here is that some women, influenced by the cultic teaching around, were claiming that woman was the originator of man (as in the sense of 'the author').

Consistant Meaning

'Silent' is the same word translated as 'quiet' in v2. So the meaning of v12 that

seems most consistent with the letters

It was the woman who was deceived and became a sinner

as a whole would be: 'I do not allow a woman to teach these things, nor to proclaim herself author of man; she must be live a peaceful life.' It would then follow on to vs13-14: 'For Adam was formed first, then Eve. And Adam was not the one deceived; it was the woman who was deceived and became a sinner.' This would speak

against the Gnostic teaching around that Eve created Adam, and that Eve was the supreme source of enlightenment. He points out the true Biblical account, and that Eve did sin.

The Hardest Verse

And so we arrive at v15: 'But women will be saved through childbearing ...' One of the hardest verses

Women will be saved through childbearing

in the New Testament! If we take this

one literally, where does it leave people like me?! The teaching of the whole New Testament is that people are saved by faith and not by works (Eph.8-9), so it cannot mean that women will gain salvation by bearing children. Nor can it mean, as some have said, that they will be preserved through the difficult process of child-birth, because many aren't!

Heretical Teaching

As before, there was Gnostic teaching around forbidding people to marry (1 Tim.4:3), and denying women their sexuality and their child-bearing func-

tion. One Gnostic writer even called upon believers to 'flee from the bondage of femininity and to choose for themselves the salvation of masculini-

ty'. I believe this verse is Paul's affirmation of the spiritual wholeness of womanhood. It is part of living peaceful and quiet lives (v2) - simply getting on with life, in faith, love and holiness.

God is not Limited

This interpretation is consistent with the teaching of the apostle who wrote that in Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, neither

male nor female - we are all one in Christ Jesus. Paul's main teaching is that each of us is to discover and use the gifts that God has given us, for the building up of His Church (1Cor.12:4-11).



God is not limited by the genitalia of the people to whom he gives his gifts. Let us affirm each other in the gifts God has given us, and release them all for the building up of God's church.

Elaine Storkey gave a very good exposition of these verses in her two sermons


Serving in the Courts of the Lord

On Target?

How are we doing on the Church Targets? David Betts looks at the progress so far on a couple of items.

The St. Barnabas Graft

The Bishop is seeking to appoint someone as Priest in Charge, and the likelihood is that such an appointment will take place in January or February next year. He will probably then spend two to three months with the present St. Barnabas' members be-



fore being joined by a roughly equal number of St.Nic's members, perhaps at Easter '94. More information about the timetable should be available in September.

Additional Morning Service

Ninety-eight replies were received to the recent questionnaire. In the light of these we believe it right to plan for two services essentially similar in style and content. The first could start at 9:15 and end by 10:30, and the second start at 11:15 and end by



12:30. Children's groups (i.e. Junior Church and Creche) will be provided at both services, but Pathfinders remain as a single group, perhaps meeting during the second service. The teaching themes would be the same at both services, but the preachers and service leaders would be different at each. The staff would be present at both services most of the time, although only taking an active part in one morning service on any one Sunday. These proposals therefore effectively mean a doubling



up of all our present service teams. We are at present planning for this in detail, and we intend to start the two services in January 1994. The monthly pattern could be as follows overleaf:-

Week	9:15	11:15
1	Communion	Morning Worship
2	Morning Worship	Family Service
3	Morning Worship	Communion
4	Family Service	Morning Worship
5	Morning Worship	Morning Worship

On Communion Sundays the children would have group teaching first and join the rest of the church at The Peace (as at present). On Morning Worship Sundays everyone, including children, would begin in church and the children go out to their groups after 25 minutes for the rest of the time, rejoining their parents after the service has ended.

In order to prepare for these changes, from September to December we hope to adopt the proposed 9:15

pattern at our present single morning service at 10:15. We shall aim to end the service by 11:30, which will give us the one-and-a-quarterhours possible once two services are started.

You may have a number of questions to ask about both the Church Graft and the Morning Services, and any of the other Targets fixed for this church year. In order to do so there will be an Church Open-Forum on Sunday September 5th, after the morning service.

Like a Mighty Tortoise moves the Church of England

This parody of a well-known hymn does seem to sum up the dreadfully slow progress the Church of England makes over some issues, and 'Children and Communion' is no exception.


Background

The recent debate goes back to 1969 with a commision chaired by the Bishop of Ely. That commission recommended that Baptism should be viewed as a sufficient basis for admitting children to Communion, prior to Confirmation.

It then took until 1976 for the General Synod to decide that there was insufficient support to proceed with any change in admission to Communion. In the meantime, some Dioceses initiated expriments of admitting baptised children to communion in certain parishes

Communion Before Confirmation?

The next landmark is the Knaresborough report, 'Communion before Confirmation?', which was published and debated in 1985. The working party chaired by the Bishop of Knaresbor-



ough (now of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich) was quite clear in its view that "It is desirable, both for clarity of principle and for effective pastoral practice, to permit the admission of baptised persons to Holy Communion, before Confirmation". The report was received by the Synod and it was left to the House of Tortoises, sorry Bishops, to act. They took until July 1991 to come back to the Synod with recommendations and it was bad news for progress. 'No change' was the cry, and they also wanted all the

experiments in the various dioceses of admitting children to communion to cease. Fortunately this latter recommendation was rejected. The only option left seems to be to confirm children at a much younger age and this is an option most dislike. There is a strong argument for conformation at an older age so that the rite becomes an act of adult Christian commitment.

Confirmation - a Church Leaving Certificate?

The Church of England is not very sure about the rite of confirmation. The experience in many parishes where children are confirmed as young teenagers and there is little youth work, is that children grow up in Sunday School, are then confirmed and shortly afterwards stop attending church. Little Jimmy is then old enought to help his dad wash the car on Sundays! A recent report claims that "the C of E is likely to build a stronger furture for itself by reasserting confirmation as a rite of adult commitment rather than as a childhood rite of admission to communion".

A Way Forward

If we really feel stongly about the issue, we should seek to keep it on the church's agenda. I think it is too soon after the last Synod debate to bring forward a motion to the Diocesan Synod and thence to the General Synod. The next elections will be in September 1995 and we should plan to get a motion ready for early in the next Synod. The way to use the full Synodical process is to discuss and debate the issues in the parish and for the PCC to pass a motion to go to the Deanery Synod. If it is sucessful in the Deanery, it would then pass to the Diocesan Synod and thence to the General Synod. But be worned, the C of E is very resistant to change, the Bishops fear that the rite of Confirmation will decline. but it has been doing that for vears!

- We should discuss the problem with our bishop, who I know is in favour, but is being held back by his fellow Bishops.
- I don't think it would be right to declare Unilateral Declaration of Independance and do our own thing, as we are members of a wider body (however frustrating that might be) and subject to the rules of that body. There are implications for relations with our neighbouring Anglican churches and for our own members when they move away from St. Nic's.





Dear Everyone.

As we sit in this twelfth century castle perched on a hill in the Austrian Alps it seems hard to believe that our Valedictory Services took place only eight days ago. So much has happened since!

At 8:00 am on the day after those memorable services, the boxes in which we had packed the books and personal treasures to be shipped to Cyprus were duly lined up on the drive of our cottage in Derbyshire. They sat there in the sunshine all day because the lorry which was supposed to collect them broke down on the M1 and no replacement was forthcoming.

The next day, once again, we waited in all morning hoping the lorry would arrive as promised. Still no haulier appeared! Eventually, alternative, seemingly unsatisfactory plans had to be made with the firm who are responsible for the shippment of our belongings. Perhaps some of you could pray, with us, that our 32 cardboard boxes will eventually reach us in Cyprus!

Since then we have been working with the international community here in Austria. Yesterday we were both involved in leading the morning service where there were people from N. Ireland and Scotland, England and France, America and Canada, Syria andd Croatia, Korea and Poland, Sweden, Hungary and India. It's an exciting, challenging

One reason why it would be wonderful for us if a few of you were able to enjoy a holiday with us here is that we have come to realise how very much we need your prayers, your love and your ongoing friendship as we step out in faith to work overseas. God didn't create Christians to 'go it alone', but rather to live in interdependent relationships. So we would welcome and value opportunities to keep in touch.

Because the Valedictory Services were occasions when we felt the love and support of so many of you, we shall cherish and feast on the memories of that day for a very long time. As we said on that day, own a debt of gratitude to David and Irene Betts, the Staff and the Missionary Committee for agreeing to accept us back into the fellowship as St. Nic's Missionaries and we look forward to keeping you all in our prayers as you pray for us.

I see two positions.

- 1 For children baptised as infants, confirmation is the opportunity to say to the world, "I now believe for myself. I am a Christian." Then they can receive communion. Therefore, for those children who say, "I believe, why can't I receive the bread and wine?", I say, "let them be confirmed".
- 2 For children or adults who were not baptised as infants, then baptism is the place to declare to the world, "I am a believer". Hence let children or adults that believe, be baptised, and then to get round Anglican rules, be confirmed immidiately, then they could receive communion.






