It began as a small pilot programme in 1998, was extended nationally in July 2001 and now forms a key part of the government's Welfare to Work strategy. The programme operates through a network of Job Brokers who aim to help disabled people and people with health conditions who wish to work to move from economic inactivity and into sustained employment. This report sets out the findings from the second wave of qualitative research with employers. It draws on interviews with 50 employers, all of whom were known to have taken part in NDDP, and had been nominated by Job Brokers as examples of good practice. It attempted to cover a range of geographical locations, employers in terms of size, sector etc. and types of Job Broker. At the time the research was carried out, NDDP had been operating nationally for two years. The interviews provided an opportunity to look closely at how the programme had developed over time, and was now being delivered, from an employer perspective. In particular, the research sought to explore the extent to which NDDP was influencing employers, the difference it was making to their recruitment practices, and to their workforce, and to look in detail at the types of relationships that existed between employers and Job Brokers. It also looked at how these relationships were felt to be of benefit to both employers and to the clients recruited through the programme.

The development model assumes that social, physical, and emotional development follows a series of stages; however it is not clear as to whether the normal developmental sequence provides the ideal learning structure for the mentally retarded. The medical model embodies a conceptual framework of physical illness, and the model places a high priority on bio-medical components of service delivery. The socio-ecological model provides the context for assessment of variables relevant to the client, and it is represented somewhat by the principle of normalisation. The dominance and success of the behavioural model is due to its partial synthesis of previous models."

The prospect of rapprochement of ABA with normalization, while an inventive idea, might be viewed as an inappropriate reversal of perspectives: such an initiative might be more appropriately phrased as rapprochement of normalization with ABA. True rapprochement attempts should be welcomed as initiatives to promote understanding between different theoretical positions and in the interests of parsimony. Persuasion attempts to change behaviour based on moral imperatives should be inspected closely."

Consideration needs to be given to parentalanxieties with regard to sexual and reproductive health issues which are surfacing with the current emphasis on community care and the philosophy of normalization."
